


Shakespeare returns to Marin! The Marin Shakespeare Company is celebrating its premiere season with the production of As You Like Is this summer at Forest Meadows.

Marin Shakespeare Company is dedicated to serving as a resource for entertainment and education, and to achieving artistic excellence in the performance of Shakespeare's plays. It provides an opportunity for local theatre artists to train and work with established professionals.

The Company will perform annually at the Forest Meadows theatre on the campus of Dominican College in San Rafael. Set on twenty-six wooded acres, this beautiful theatre was designed for Shakespearean productions in 1967; the beauty of the surroundings and the magnificent seffecting pool make Forest Meadows one of the country's most elegant outdoor theatres, providing a peaceful scenic setting in accessible central Marin.

The Marin Shakespeare Company is a revival of the Marin Shakespeare Festival, which played from 1961 to 1973. The Festival's initial performances were produced by founders Ann and John Brebner first at the Art and Garden Center in Ross and later at the newly built Forest Meadows Theatre. The many expressions of community enthusiasm greeting this project repeatedly hark back to the Festival, its unique beauty and its vitality as a center of family entertainment.

We are proud to give to this community the special gift of Shakespearean theatre. Shakespeare is both profound and fun. Director's Notes

Early in May of this year I spent a day here, maybe sitting in the seat you are sitting in now, and let the calmness, beauty and rightness of the surroundings invade me.

A deer appeared behind the stage and wandered away into the forest...the deer that Duke Senior would talk of so lovingly, the deer that would be reluctantly killed so those living in the forest might be sustained.

As the day passed, individual bird songs became clear, the distant sound of motorcycles and leaf blowers became less and less offensive and the play revealed itself to me: Shakespeare speaking down the years.

The longer I immersed myself in this Forest of Arden the less the court belonged here at all. Greedy, voracious, needy, angry and vicious, they would destroy the forest. I hated to think of Duke Frederick being allowed in the gate. He belonged with the invasive noises of the outside world.

His brother Duke Senior walked easily in this place. And so the ideas came. Touchstone, escaping from the court is taught by Corin, Silvius and William, all of whom he could outwit at 'deals,' all of whom have a natural respect and wisdom which he must learn in order to survive. How lucky Rosalind and Celia are to experience moving from violence to safety, and in safety discovering love.

The forest lords would plant trees, treasure water, care for each other and Adam lovingly, and understand the continuum of life as Jaques does. Somewhere not far away is Duke Frederick, who having come into the forest to kill his brother has experienced a change both rich and strange, now devoting his life to prayer, reading and contemplation, and returning the worldly possessions wrested from his beother. The forest felt so safe by now that I did not mind knowing that Duke Frederick had entered it.

The survival of the Forest of Arden, wherever it may be, depends on how we care for it. It in turn will care for us. Four hundred years ago Shakespeare knew this. It is our wish that as you leave this Forest of Arden, you will carry in your hearts laughter and joy from As You Like It and a loving dedication to our environment.

"The actors are come hither" by John Brehner, co-founder Marin Shakespeare Festival

1960 was a very good year. My then-wife Ann and myself founded the Marin Shakespeare Festival, the Brebner Casting Agency and our family.

The idea of open air Shakespeare had been directly inspired by my experiences at the Oregon Shakespeare Festival, where in 1950, while a Fulbright Scholar at Stanford University, I had played leading roles in all four of that season's productions. I had also fallen willingly and unequivocably under the spell of Angus Bowmer, Ashland's founding producer. His enthusiasm for the Bard, his belief in his box-office appeal, his conviction that thousands of people would sit in the open air in the Southern Oregon nights to witness. uncut performances, was nothing short of amazing to me.

I was perhaps discouraged by early experiences in Regents' Park, London, where Robert Afkins annually braved the vagaries of the English climate to present a seemingly endless series of productions of "A Midsummer Night's Dream." However, after several years of living in Marin County, it seemed that circumstances couldn't be better for a successful attempt to eliminate the negative and accentuate the positive: this seemed good territory for the Bard.

The ideal location presented itself: a rustic amphitheatre with a large platform stage on the Marin Art & Garden Center grounds. It was ringed with redwood trees and the outline of Mt. Tam formed the backdrop. The Board of Trustees of the Center and their patron, Mrs. Norman Livermore, agreed

wholeheartedly.

Thus the Marin Shakespeare Festival, supported by a group of enthusiastic and talented volunteers, was been in 1961. True to Robert Atkins tradition, the first production was "A Midsummer Night's Dream" which ran for six weekends in July of that year. Two risers and a pair of antique chairs provided the set; burlap, in varying shades of greens and brown the costumes. We must have spent almost \$250 on the production. Audience response was immediate and enthusiastic. Angus Bowmer was right. People would flock to the Bard.

The following year the plays were "Henry V" and "Twelfth Night." A coffee house structure was designed and built and volunteers appeared to staff it. The Center Board arranged for concrete block terraces to be installed as seating. The stage was repaired, landscaping plans begun, the organization grew, seasonal members multiplied.

In following seasons the stage saw productions of "Othello," "The Merchant of Venice," and "Richard III" with the first appearance on any stage of a very small but totally confident Alexander Brebner, my son. A vigorous version of "Henry IV, Part 1" was supported by a rare but impressive summer thunderstorm, with the audience sheltering from the rain under the redwoods — shades of Regent's Park!

The festival began to attract the participation of actors, designers and technicians from all over the Bay Area. A West Coast contest for casting the lead roles in "Romeo & Juliet" drew a large response.

Actors who have since developed

impressive professional careers in theatre and film, such as Dakin Matthews, David Dukes and Will Marchetti cut their teeth on the Bard at Ross.

The success of the Festival proved to be its undoing. Increased parking problems and the necessity for vocal projection by the cast resulted in mounting opposition from nearby neighbors and the town of Ross. In true Elizabethan tradition, the "rogues and vagabonds" had perforce to move on.

New and generous patrons were soon found in the sisters of Dominican College. They agreed to allow the Festival to move to a student picnic area with a creek flowing through it in the midst of twentry-six acres of woodland called Forest Meadows. In consultation with an architect retained by Dominican, the site was redesigned to provide a concrete playing area over the creek, with a reflecting pool to provide visual and acoustic enhancement. Redwood benches were built and trees planted to provide a comfortable seating area.


The Marin Shakespeare Festival opened in Forest Meadows in 1967 with a repeat of the ever popular "Twelfth Night" and "King Lear." George Ede, who played the title role, was our first Equity Guest Artist. The Shakespeare Festival prospered, adding musicals like "Brigadoon," "Once Upon a Mattress," and a children's theatre production of "Wind in

Production concepts grew more adventurous and ambitious. An experimental interpretation of "Richard II," invoking classical Japanese acting techniques drew mixed reviews. A lavish production of "Anthony and Cleopatra" strained our resources to the hilt. But exciting productions continued to draw good audiences, including a revival of "A Midsummer Night's Dream" with a very young Jay Brebner as one of Puck's gang.

The late sixties and early seventies, however, were an era of social unrest and generational problems. A major arson fire destroyed a whole season's costumes and props. This, coupled with an increasingly unmanageable budget deficit, led to the cancellation of the contract with Dominican College.

So the Festival was on the move again. After trying two seasons at San Francisco's Palace of Fine Arts

as an expanded Equity company, it was decided to end what had been a long and successful tradition.

As part of its rich Marin County heritage, some distinguished careers were launched, many hundreds of children were introduced to the Bard and many thousands more people of all ages had had an opportunity to enjoy "Shakespeare Under the Stars."

So it is an exciting and wonderful event that will be happening in Forest Meadows this summer of 1990. The Bard is back! Long may be live in the shape of the new Marin Shakespeare Company.

From all his faithful supporters over the years may we say, in his words, "Thanks, thanks and ever thanks."

Marin Shakespeare Company 1991 Season

Shakespeare at Forest Meadows is no passing fancy. We will be back next year, with an expunded season, featuring one comedy yet to be announced and one tragedy, Shakespeare's great bloody masterpiece of twisted ambition, MacBeck.

If you enjoyed the Forest of Arden, just wait until you see Birmum Wood, with its battles and witches and epic action.

In addition, the Shakespeare Birthday Party will return, better than ever with many of the stars who made this April's event such a huge success. The "blowout bash" is scheduled at the Marin Theatre Company in late April.

The Shakespeare Auction will take place in the late spring. Next year's items include a one-week Hawaiian vacation.

Planning continues also for a summer training program to allow local students the opportunity to work and study with professional actors, directors and technicians. Students will attend classes in Shakepearean acting, voice, movement and stagecraft; participate in mainstage productions; and take part in an appointice performance.

Ideas and suggestions are welcome, as is your help. The Shakespeare Guild will continue to allow enthusiastic volunteers the opportunity to be involved with productions. Neighbors wishing to provide summer housing or parttime work for actors will be greatly appreciated. And, as always, any help with fundraising will enable us to achieve our goals more easily.

Plan to help or to give or, most importantly, to come and enjoy!
